Smiling says it all

(Photos courtesy Amy Blake) HOT SPRINGS — Operation Smile changes lives by performing surgeries to repair cleft palates, cleft lips and other facial deformities. A recent mission trip to Cambodia has changed the life of a Bath County High School senior, too.

Rebekah Blake, daughter of Timmy and Amy Blake of Hot Springs, spent late February and early March in the Southeast Asian country as part of an Operation Smile mission trip. She said the experience gave her a new perspective.

"We take a lot of things for granted. They don't hardly have anything," Blake said. "It made me realize I have a

good life here and made me try to humble myself and put myself in that situation. If I were in that situation, I wouldn't survive. There is so much poverty there."

She said the trip was what she expected and then some. "I tried to prepare myself for it, and it was a lot better than I expected. I was expecting it to be worse than it was. I

expected terrible food and no toilets, but it wasn't like that," Blake said.

Following breakfast around 7 a.m. each day of her trip, Blake said she and the others on the mission would bus about 15 minutes to a hospital. She would teach children about hydration, burn care and prevention, oral hygiene, hand washing and nutrition. "The hospital was very open and had no air conditioning," she said.

Lunch was made in the hospital, and one of the common dishes was chicken wrapped in a banana leaf and fried on a stick. Rice is also a staple of the Cambodian diet, she noted. "They eat rice with everything," Blake said.

After lunch, she spent the rest of the day occupying children before their surgeries and handing out "smile

bags" when they came out of the operating room. She would go into the Child Life area and work with children five at a time to help them get ready for their surgeries.

"To get that whole experience, to meet people and see them come in the door looking for help, then when they come out of the operating room you see a different look on their face like they are saying 'thank you.' It's something I'll never forget," she said.

She recounted her experiences with two people in particular. One was a 46-year-old man who had been born with a cleft lip. "He had never been to school and didn't really have any friends. Once he had his operation, he told us his story," Blake said. "He didn't really talk before the surgery."

Another was a small child with a bilateral cleft whose surgery required repair in two places. "I took him into child life and he was crying. I got my scrubs on and went into the surgery with him. It was fascinating," Blake said. "He woke up during the surgery and it was really scary, but the anesthesiologist was able to get him back to sleep. While he was in recovery, his family thanked me for being there."

She also had the chance to visit the Operation Smile club at a private school attended mostly by foreign students. She discussed fund raising and other possible club activities with them.

There was some free time during the trip, such as a Cambodian shopping experience. "When you go into a place, they expect you to bargain with them. It was really cool, a really great experience," she said.

She also was able to have a "fish massage." She put her feet in a tank, and the fish swam around them.

While at the market, Blake said she needed to use the restroom. "There was a lady at a table in the front, and when you went in the floor was full of water. The bowl of the toilet was in the ground. And,

there was no toilet paper. It was disgusting. When I came out, the lady said I had to pay for using it. It was an experience I was expecting, just not at that particular moment," she said.

The real point where Blake realized the trip had changed her was after a visit to an AIDS orphanage on her last day in Cambodia. She said despite their situation, the children there were very happy. "They were happy because they had what they needed. They had brothers, sisters, food, electricity and were getting an education. I just wanted to stand there and cry because they were so happy," Blake said.

She took 12 quilts with her on the trip, and donated them to the orphanage. She said orphanage officials plan to hang them there.

Not only has the trip changed her outlook on many things, but Blake said it has possibly changed her future. She worked with the child life specialist, who among other duties helped prepare children for surgery. "I think I'd like to work with Operation Smile while I'm young and willing to travel. I've always wanted to help others, but this trip really strengthened that desire," she said.

VIRGINIA BEACH — Members of the Bath County High School chapter of Family, Career and Community Leaders of America participated in a weekend leadership training conference April 12-14.

Attendees participated in a weekend of workshops and sessions that challenged, informed, and motivated members and their advisers to learn more about leadership through FCCLA. Along with nearly 1,300 other advisers and members, Bath County's FCCLA chapter adviser, Adaline Hodge, accompanied four members to the meeting.

To begin the conference, nearly 850 members participated in STAR Events, a series of competitive events that demonstrate proficiency and achievement in leadership and job-related skills. There are 81categories of STAR Events for members to compete in as a team or

Bath's Kyanna Plecker participated in Cake Decorating and won second place. She received a gold medal and a \$2,000 scholarship from the Culinary Institute of Virginia.
