In Science we learned about Matter and we are moving on to Weather. Have your child watch the weather on TV. Let them be meteorologist and predict the weather by the clouds. Have them read your thermometer at home. This will help them learn about the world around them and also weather. We are all looking forward to pretty weather ahead!



THIRD GRADE MEWS Mrs. Sizemore

In third grade this very snowy nine weeks, we have been focusing on nonfiction reading. We read all about the Iditarod Dog Sled Race in Alaska. We did research on mushers in the race, and we are even taking part in our class "Iditaread." We also read about famous Americans like Susan B. Anthony, Rosa Parks, and Cesar Chavez.

In math, students continue to master their multiplication and division facts. We have learned how to find elapsed time and are plugging away at geometry. Third graders are practicing skills to show off our learning at the end of the year by working lots of practice problems on IXL. The Testing Trolls will not be able to trick us!

In Social Studies this nine weeks we have explored the ancient civilizations of Greece, Rome, and Mali. We learned about the land and people and found out about all the contributions these civilizations have made to our world that we still use today.

We also had the opportunity to make some fantastic art projects while learning more about the ancient civilizations through the Children's Art Network. Thanks again to all of the wonderful parent volunteers who helped out with this!

FOURTH GRADE MEWS - Ms. Manion

Fourth grade wrestled with fractions for the time we had here at school. We worked on understanding as denominators get larger the actual size of the piece of the whole gets smaller. We worked on simplifying fractions and finding equivalent fractions. We worked on adding and subtracting fractions with like denominators. We are still working on adding and subtracting fractions with unlike denominators as well as comparing and ordering fractions. We also tried to work on decimals but we will be covering decimals the fourth nine weeks. In addition, we will be working on geometry, measurement, and equations.

We worked on cause and effect and context clues during the third nine weeks. We started working on sensory words and author's purpose. We will focus on main idea and supporting details with a review of all comprehension skills during the fourth nine weeks. As always, students need to be reading at home. In Virginia Studies, we studied the American Revolution, created the United States government, learned a bit about life in the young United States, and finally made it through the Civil War. We will cover 1865 until present day and review it all before our SOL test in the upcoming weeks. Students had the opportunity to review Jamestown with an outreach program from Jamestown settlement. The students really enjoyed it.

In science, we worked on understanding the basic laws of physics, did some more with electricity and magnetism, and studied ecosystems. Students had the opportunity for an "Animals in Their Habitats" program with the Children's Art Network sponsored by the Bath Arts Association. They had fun drawing the animals in their habitats. We will be covering more of the solar system and plants during the final nine weeks. There will also be a review of Virginia's resources.

5/6 GRADE LANGUAGE ARTS/ 6/7 SCIENCE MEWS - Mrs. Secoy

6th & 7th grade Language Arts



We've been very busy this quarter! 7th grade read <u>The Outsider's</u> and 6th grade really enjoyed reading <u>Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry</u> as we studied the elements of fiction. Right now we are exploring poetry, and we're using music to focus on figurative language!

Students have enjoyed listening to songs like "Blown Away" by Carrie Underwood, "Viva la Vida" by Coldplay, "Compass" by Lady Antebellum, and "Count on Me" by Bruno Mars.

Everyone has also studied the life and poems of 3 different poets, and we're gearing up to start writing our own poetry! I can't wait to see what students write!

7th grad<mark>e Life Scienc</mark>e

7th grade science has shifted into our study of biomes, ecosystems, and relationships between organisms. We are using maps to study where different kinds of biomes are found and are exploring the animals and plants found in each biome. Soon we'll be looking at the relationships between different organisms, and we'll start talking about how plants behave. Looking at plant response to stimulus is always exciting!

6th grade Science



6th grade science is well into our study of the solar system, now. They are really interested in all of the new data about Pluto that has come from the arrival of the New Horizons probe! We are continuing to study watersheds and our nature trail, as well. The students love going out to do water quality testing and have become excellent observational scientists! We will be completing space projects over the next couple of weeks before we shift our focus to watersheds to really look at the data we've been collecting and decide what it means.

FIFTH GRADE MEWS Ms. Bayne

Once again, we are finishing another quarter and wow did it go fast! In 5th grade Science we learned about the five Kingdoms of living things and how the largest is the animal kingdom. The students loved learning about the two different types of animals, vertebrates and invertebrates. To extend our animal knowledge we will be researching an animal to learn about its adaptation and how it helps the animal to survive. We will also be learning about ocean geography and the motions of the ocean water. Did you know that there are giant patches of garbage caught up in the currents of the Pacific Ocean? We will also learn about how what we do here in Bath County can affect the waters of the Atlantic Ocean, so please recycle, reuse and don't pollute our waters.

In 5th grade Language Arts we read and applied our reading knowledge to the novel, "The Sign of the Beaver," before viewing the movie. We decided that the book was much more enjoyable than the movie! We also did some research and read biography books. Our library had many interesting famous people to read about, but each student settled on one person and read a biography book about them. After reading the book, the students then wrote an essay about them, completed a timeline and created a biography gift box for their biography person. The biography gift boxes will be in the library for a few more weeks if you would like to stop by and enjoy them.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION MEWS—Ms. Forsyth

Only nine weeks remaining in the school year?! Time flies by so quickly and your children are growing up so very fast. The weather presented challenges with the two-hour delays and no school. Grades 4-7 Aerobic Fitness Assessment was completed right before spring break and the students PACER scores indicated that in the gym the majority of them have been working hard.

The final testing will be in May, and the students will run PACER and also do the mile. In Aerobic Fitness standards the students goal is to meet the HFZ(Healthy Fitness Zone) for the mile and/or PACER. Students often like one test more than the other, it is a matter of personal preference.

Upper grade students will work on aerobic endurance, upper body strength and core strength utilizing various activities and equipment in the gym. Grades 4-7 have Family Life Education for 3-4 days in the last nine weeks. Once a date is set papers will be sent home with the students for you to read, and materials will be available at the school for you to view.

In the lower grades we will continue to work on throwing and catching skills using various items. Kicking and hitting a stationary object and then a moving object. Lead up kickball activities, t-ball and coach pitch lead up games will be covered in the last nine weeks. The students will continue to work on gross motor skills, teamwork and cooperation.

MUSIC MEWS - Mrs. Lindsay



Classes have continued to be busy during the past few weeks. Patriotic Music has been a huge topic in most classes during the third nine weeks. Each class has focused on one Patriotic song. Stu-

dents are working to learn the words of this song as well as the meaning of these words. The overall plan is for students to know several important Patriotic songs by the end of fifth grade.

Kindergarten students have been learning about the parts of the guitar. They continue to participate in lots of movement activities as well as classroom singing.

First Graders have been learning about several musical notes and participating in rhythmic activities. They continue to build their repertoire of songs. These students love to sing and play rhythm instruments! First Grade's patriotic song is This Land is Your Land.

Second grade continue to work on following the words of a song. Understanding rhythm continues to be an important topic. America the Beautiful is the Patriotic song that second grade is learning.

Third Grade is now studying about the Woodwind Family. The Percussion family will be next! Third grade has learned so much about reading music and understanding musical symbols. I am quite proud of them. Third grade is studying the Star Spangled Banner, our national anthem!

Fourth graders are currently learning to play the Recorder. Students have learned three notes and will continue working with the recorder until sometime in May. The fourth grade has talked about our "old" State song – Carry Me Back to Ole Virginny. We have been introduced to our current state song – Our Great Virginia.

Fifth Graders are learning about the Music of the Twentieth Century. We are looking at the important styles of music from each decade. We are introduced to outstanding performers of each decade. Listening devices are an important part of our class discussions as well. The Patriotic song for this group is The Fifty States in Rhyme. Be sure to have a fifth grader sing this for you. We are currently about half way through it! Fun song!

The sixth grade class spent a lot of time learning about Classical Music. We are learning about Medieval, Baroque, Classical, Romantic and Twentieth Century music. As we discuss each musical period, we are introduced to composers and instruments of the time period. We also listen to musical selections of the time.



Seventh grade enjoyed playing the guitar for the past several weeks. Students have learned to play Happy Birthday, Louie, Louie, Smoke on the Water and Wipe Out. We have also talked about some of the great Jazz musicians of the 1920s and 1930s. During the last nine weeks, we will also talk about musicals.

We had several students participate in the "Celebration of the Arts" event that was held at BCHS on March 23. This was an event featuring middle school musicians from Alleghany, Bath and Covington. The band and choral students got to work with a guest conductor and then performed a concert on Friday evening. It was supposed to be a two day event but because of the weather, we condensed it into a one day event. Our students represented Millboro Elementary School well. I was very proud of them.

First grade through fifth grade have been working on making inferences, using context clues to identify the meaning of unknown words, multiple meaning words, homophones (words that sound the same but have different meanings), identifying the cause and effect, identifying the main idea and details, and so much more! This only begins to shed light on the many skills and strategies we have been conquering!
